

President's Report (Vince Pagano) Loon Lake Homeowners' Association 12 Noon, Sunday July 8, 2012

LLHA services are related to the preservation and maintenance of our Lake water quality and quality of the surrounding environment, and the enhancement of lake living.

To this end the Loon Lake Board of Directors, volunteers and committee members have accomplished the following in the past, including 2011-2012:

Water Quality Monitoring.

• Conducted yearly by the Adirondack Watershed Institute at Paul Smith's College with the help of volunteers, including our own (Stuart Lucks and others), testing for pH, alkalinity, calcium, phosphorus, nitrates, chlorophyll-a, transparency, chloride, conductivity, color, aluminum, and oxygen. Over the past 14 years the quality has improved significantly. The results of the 2011 tests indicate that our lake is classified as a slightly late oligotrophic lake; that is, it has the lowest levels of total phosphorus, low levels of chlorophyll-a and high transparencies in comparison to Mesotrophic and Eutrophic lake classifications. In addition, all the other parameters captioned above are within normal limits or better than normal. Microbiology Tests (2010)

Low concentrations of E. coli were detected in several areas;

however, these concentrations were well below the concentrations that would pose a health hazard.

Lake Quality (Aquatic Plants Study) (2011)

No Invasive Aquatic Plant Species Detected

A survey of Loon Lake aquatic plants, conducted by Corey of Paul Smith's College Aquatic Institute, revealed that Loon

Lake apparently has not yet been contaminated with invasive plant species; e.g., Eurasian Milfoil, Water Chestnut, etc. The search for invasive species consisted of surface observations. Payment for the survey's \$1000 price tag came from the LLHA Invasive Species fund, money donated by Loon Lake property owners. You may recall that LLHA members, at our annual meeting in July 2009 resolved to conduct a lake surface survey yearly and a more costly diver search every 2 to 3 years.
